A Generous Man

Sam Stein was a man with a big heart. He gave generously of his money and his time to over 35 charitable organizations in Sandusky, Ohio and the San Diego, CA area. Most of these organizations are associated with children, the elderly and health care.

Sam was born in 1907 in Cleveland. At 14, he ran away from home and was taken under the wing of a food distributor from Youngstown. At 19, Sam began selling coffee to restaurants and got the idea of saving time in the kitchen by providing them ready-made hamburger patties. He used an ice cream scoop to form the balls of ground beef, flattened them into patties and separated the patties with wax paper for easy storage and use. And so, Grill Meats in Sandusky, Ohio was founded.

The Steins owned Sam Stein
Associates, a major manufacturer
of food processing equipment and
Chef's Pantry, a distributor of frozen
foods. In an article written about
Sam in 2003, he stated, "When I see
a need, I fix it!" This seemed to be
a motto that resonated with Sam
throughout his life.

In the early 1980s, the hospice movement was beginning to make strides in the United States. The Providence Hospital Hospice Association began in Sandusky in 1981. A plan was presented to the local hospital boards and all



three agreed to mutually support and fund the newly incorporated hospice program. Sam had been the president of the board of Good Samaritan Hospital. According to Sam's daughter, Marcia Stein Goff, he was very well respected within the local community. It was at this time Sam and Rose Stein made a very generous donation to be equally divided among the three hospitals for the purpose of funding the hospice program.

In 1984, the name was changed to Stein Hospice Services, to honor Sam and Rose. This year marks the 35th Anniversary of Stein Hospice and because of the generosity of the Steins, patients and their families continue to be cared for during life's final journey.

Now 35 years later, the hospice movement is burgeoning. So is Stein Hospice. As we celebrate our 35th year, I want to share with you how we have grown

Last year:

- 1,461 men, women and children were admitted as patients;
- We had an average daily census of 300 patients;
- Our volunteers donated an average of 300 hours each week;
- And Camp Good Grief was held in 4 locations, reaching over 100 children;

But numbers only tell part of our story.

As a result of our long-time commitment to Veterans, we assisted with the opening of an additional wing at the Ohio Veterans home in Georgetown, Ohio in 2011. In the years since, our reputation for excellent service grew in the community. Today we provide services to individuals who need our assistance in Adams, Brown, Clinton and Clermont Counties. Today, we serve over 25 community members in their homes.

To help support these programs and services, we host many events throughout the summer and fall. We golfed and sailed and ran. We ate wings and dressed our furry friends in costumes, all in an effort to raise money and awareness of our many services and programs for patients and their families.

I am happy to report that consistent with the promise made when we opened our doors 35 years ago to bring support, love and quality of life to terminally ill patients and their families, we continue to grow and provide excellent care to the individuals in our community. We strive to position ourselves to be strong enough to tackle the new challenges before us. These challenges include meeting the special end of life needs of our aging baby boomer population and better serving our dying Veterans in the face of federal budget cuts.

I am confident that with your continued support we will able to provide excellent service in the next 35 years and beyond.
