Stein Hospice: Looking Forward to the Future

As we enter the new year, Stein Hospice will continue to offer quality hospice and palliative care services to the community, but we must do so while adapting to the lower reimbursement trends in healthcare.

"We have been dealing with decreased Medicare reimbursement for the past few years and will be contending with another 12% decrease in 2017. At the same time, we are serving more and more patients and their families who have a variety of hospice

and palliative care needs," explains Jan Bucholz, MBA, MSN, RN, CHC, Chief Executive Officer. "As a result, we will have to go back to our roots, meaning we will have to rely more on volunteers, donations and grants, and collaborative efforts with other healthcare organizations."

Volunteers have always been an integral part of the Stein Hospice team, filling roles that range from direct contact with patients to providing clerical and fundraising support for the organization. The value of hospice volunteers cannot be overstated. Volunteers often connect with patients on a deep, personal level, which provides the Stein Hospice care team with valuable insights concerning the overall impact of the level of comfort and care that is provided.

As a Medicare-certified hospice program Stein Hospice is federally mandated to integrate hospice volunteers into administrative or patient services. The United States government requires that the total number of hours that hospice volunteers contribute must equal at least 5% of the total number of patient care hours provided by paid hospice employees and contract staff.

"Stein Hospice was founded on the strength of our volunteers, and we will have to depend on them more than ever in the future," says Jan. "Hospice is worthy work. Volunteers walk away knowing they have made a significant difference. We like to say that both our staff and volunteers have an emotional tie to this work."



In addition to current volunteer positions, new programs are being developed, such as the Vigil Team, which will increase the opportunities for volunteers to interact with families and patients. Vigil Team volunteers will sit with patients and their families under the supervision of a nurse when death is expected within the day. Volunteers will fill greater roles in bereavement and support groups as well.

Generous donations from the community and grants have always played a crucial role in Stein Hospice's success. Because of the increasing reliance on donations, Amy Skolnik has been appointed to the position of Development Director. "Stein is very blessed to be the recipient of substantial financial support from the residents and businesses of our community. Our ability to serve patients and families regardless of ability to pay is a direct result of this support," says Amy.

Throughout its growth, Stein Hospice has collaborated with other healthcare providers, which according to Jan, "has proved to be the right strategy. Since our beginning, we have partnered with area hospitals to provide services in Erie, Huron, Ottawa, Lorain, Sandusky, Seneca, and Brown Counties. Through these partnerships, we provide the best end-of-life care for our patients and families without competing with other healthcare providers or duplicating services. We will continue our current collaborations and pursue new ones when appropriate."

Despite the looming reimbursement issues, Jan is confident Stein Hospice will be able to maintain the level of service the community has come to expect. "We just have to do things a little differently, but it can be done. We have a sacred bond with members of the community to be there with them or their loved ones when dying. It's a commitment we will continue to honor."

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Volunteer Opportunities at Stein Hospice

Direct Care Team

Direct Care Team Members work with patients and families in their residence, which may be a home or a facility. They lend a supporting presence under Stein Hospice care. Some of their responsibilities may include:

- Providing companionship for the patient
- Relieving caregivers to help them maintain a balance in their own lives
- Providing transportation or running errands

Supply Delivery Team

Supply Delivery Team Members transport much-needed supplies medicine and equipment to patients whose caregivers are unable to do so. They must have their own transportation and insurance, and are often asked to make a delivery with very little notice. Their services are a vital part of Stein Hospice care.

Bereavement Team

Bereavement Team Members are special listeners who help the family after the death of the patient. They provide loving, compassionate support to surviving friends and family for at least 13 months after the death of their loved one. Additional training is required. The Bereavement team:

- Visit and listen to family members
- Assure grieving persons that their feelings of loss, loneliness and sadness are normal
- Assist with social or educational functions
- Help with memorial services
- Assist with the Children's bereavement department

Administrative Support Team

Administrative Support Team Members work in the office providing support to the administrative staff. Support team volunteers are encouraged to attend the "Introduction to Hospice" volunteer course. Some of their responsibilities include:

- Providing clerical support
- Assisting with deliveries
- Assisting with general secretarial functions, including mailings
- Helping with community service projects

Special Project Team

Special Project Team Members work with Stein Hospice staff members on special events such as the annual "Light up a Life" celebration, Memorial Services and fundraisers. Jobs include baking cookies, gardening, assisting with registration and event set-up. If you have a special talent or hobby, and would like to share it with us, we have a place for you.
